Bridging the Digital Divide

Having retired from industry and having served as a grant writer for various organizations since, Claire Hauenstein is well versed in computer use.

Still, she knew that as with most things, there is always more to learn.

That's why Hauenstein has been among those at Ferris Hills at West Lake taking on-site seminars from Daniel Jones, a Rochester-based independent consultant and instructor who specializes in providing older adults with a greater understanding of the technology available to them.

At Ferris Hills, his twice-monthly seminars started in late April and continue through mid-July, with topics ranging from security, to video chats, to apps and beyond.

Hauenstein is finding the 90-minute

seminars to be "excellent."

"I'm very impressed. Not only is he knowledgeable, but he's got a very good way of presenting," she said. "Everything he explains is very understandable, from people who only have the basics to people who've been doing it for years."

The seminars are the result of Wi-Fi being installed throughout the community and an interest expressed by residents, many of whom took a crash course in Zoom and other virtual options for keeping in touch with friends and family during the pandemic.

Ray Hasenauer, a longtime Canandaigua resident who moved to Ferris Hills last fall, was a consulting engineer and noted



that for many older adults, widespread computer use came along at a time many were beginning to eye retirement and may have not had the time, nor

the interest, to stay up to speed.

"There are probably a lot of people here who are whizzes but also a lot of people like me who just missed the whole deal," he said.

Hasenauer said Jones has an effective teaching style that keeps students engaged and ensures they feel comfortable asking anything.

The seminars are appreciated, he added, because more than ever, computers seem to be intertwined with everyone's daily lives. "It's a must," he said.
